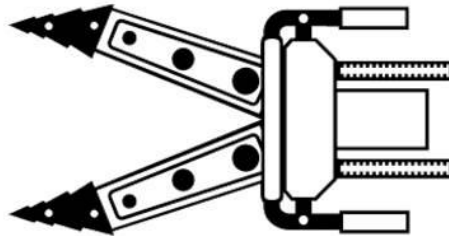

Instructors from several departments will bring different ideas and solutions for each evolution so the firefighter can sharpen and/or learn new skills. This will be an Intensive Hands on class.

16 Life Safety Initiatives

This 8 hour class will explore the latest information to enhance the first 6 LSI, the ones that you as a Firefighter have control over, to help you do your job Safer. In all we will explore the LSI's #1 through #6 and #13. You will take away from this class, a better understanding of why a change is needed, armed with a better knowledge of Building Construction, Driver Safety, Situation Awareness, and Mental Health Issues for today's Firefighter. Along with tools for your "Tool Box".

The Coordinated Fire Ground

After completing this class, participants will be more aware of the functions necessary to accomplish fire suppression and rescue, including Engine and Truck Company Operations, on every fire ground, no matter if you are on a \$750,000 ladder truck or the FF association '69 Ford Pick Up. We will discuss scene size up, choosing the 1st in line, and the jobs of the other on scene companies. Student will perform several live fire and hands on evolutions to form a better understanding of these functions through practice.

Force, Search, and Vent

Instructor: Mike Bloom, Greater Round Lake Fire Protection District

There are 3 major functions of the first in truck on the fire ground. They are forcible entry, search, and ventilation. This class will provide the students with hands on drills for all 3. Student will perform multiple evolutions with forcible entry, search, and ventilation. While the day progresses we will put all 3 of these tasks together in simulated scenarios.

Cool Under Pressure, SCBA Training

This class is designed to build confidence and understanding for those individuals who have limited experience using Self Contained Breathing Apparatus. The goals of this course are to return the student to their department with a focused understanding of their SCBA, its components, uses, limitations, and emergency procedures. Along with the ability to survive in a hostile environment using their mind, body, and SCBA. The majority of this class takes a hands-on format with students working with obscured vision.

Breach It, Break It, Cut It

This class will re-develop your skills for tunneling to a victim. With this intense hands on drills you will get the experience needed to perform basic RIT operations or start an operation for your TRT teams.

Liquid Fuel Fires

Instructor: Gary Baum, Deputy Chief, Fox River & Countryside Fire Rescue District

A cognitive and hands on program to examine the properties of flammable liquids and compressed/ liquefied gases. The respective containers and potential emergencies will also be reviewed as it relates to response considerations. Fire and vapor suppression response will be discussed and then practiced with the use of water, foam, and dry agent application.

Railroading 101

Instructor: Matthew Thompson, Union Pacific Railroad

Hazardous materials are shipped in tank cars every day. Responders need to understand valves and fittings along with design safety as an important part of initial size up. This course is intended for responders who have contact or who are impacted by tank cars during a rail emergency, whether it is a derailment, grade crossing collision, or some other event where responders and railroad personnel could interface. Law enforcement, EMS, emergency management, and shippers are potential participants that should attend this class. Operating in a railroad environment and case studies will be presented to illustrate essential aspects of working a rail incident. You will leave with a better understanding of tank cars and their valves and fittings found on non-pressure and pressure tank cars by name, function, and location on the tank car.

Advance Extrication Procedures

Advanced Auto Extrication is an all hands on course utilizing hydraulic, pneumatic and hand tools. The focus is on advanced stabilization and tool use to free entrapped victims in simulated accident scenarios.

Tools of All Sorts for Extrication

Hands on class. Students will be exposed to extrication techniques, vehicle technologies, and tool usage. Scene size up, stabilization, glass management, patient contact/removal, opening doors, roof removal techniques, fifth door, and dash lifts will be taught. Vehicles on side and roofs will be used. Squad company scenarios will be used. Hand tools, air chisels and hydraulic tool will be utilized.

Failure to read the fire and the building

Fighting fires in buildings has and always will be a dangerous task for firefighters, and fire departments all across North America train throughout the year so when the tones go off and they face that challenge they do so as efficiently and safely as possible. Yet, when you look at the firefighter injury and death reports while operating at building fires and the contributing factors, one major factor that seems to be overshadowed was their failure to read the fire and building properly. Not having a real and true understanding of how the fire is going to react to the building and how the building is going to react to the fire can often lead to disastrous results and firefighters are way too precious and specials to waste on bad decisions. Join Chief Lasky as he reviews and discusses the steps necessary for a good “read” at your next building fire.

Survivability Profiling

Instructor: Chris Hohol, Chief, Bellevue Fire Rescue (retired)

The course will teach the participants about incident survivability factors, and patient survival potentials in a variety of situations. Students will learn the ten rules of engagement for structural firefighting and how they impact occupant survival. Students will review several case studies and receive an overview of studies from NIST, UL, LA County FD and the USDOT. The course is intended as an analysis of current trending in building and incident survivability profiling, size up methods and impacts of furnishings; and while all incidents are unique and must be judged on their merit; there are commonalities.

Scene Management of Burns and Utilization of Helicopter

ITLS Access

Instructors: Rock River EMS

ITLS Access give EMS crews and first responders the training they need to reach, stabilize and extricate trapped patients. The course includes techniques for hybrid vehicles in addition to its primary focus on traditional vehicles. The eight-hour course is built around the concept of using hand tools commonly carried on an ambulance or first responder unit.

PPE required (Gloves, Goggles, Helmet, Boots).

EMS First on Scene Scenarios

Instructors: Gary Banjac and Bob LaFurge

The purpose of the course is to provide the EMT the skills, knowledge, ability and training by establishing priorities for removing persons from crashed vehicles. The course emphasizes the development of EMT skills in gaining safe access, freeing and removing an injured or trapped individual without causing further trauma. Specific objectives of the course are to teach the rescuer roles and responsibilities within the extrication process, to develop skills in analyzing the accident scene situation, establishing command, scene safety, vehicle stabilization, gaining patient access, disentangling and safely removing the victim from the wreckage. Basic rescue tool knowledge. Develop awareness of hazards that might be encountered. Basic vehicle knowledge, recognizing new car technologies.

Large Area Search

Instructors: Deputy Chief Tim Salo and Lt Tony Dinges, Byron Fire Protection District

This class will teach participants techniques and procedures for searching large buildings. Students will be instructed in proper tool selection, building size-up, and working as a company. Class will involve both classroom and hands on training.

Rural Water Supply

The Rural Water Supply class is designed to provide the student with a basic understanding of moving water in the rural areas of their community. Areas covered include use of LDH in the rural area, set of folding tanks for maximum benefit, use of jet siphons and relay operations for maximum flows. Also covered is how to get maximum delivery from a municipal water system when filling tenders.

Fire Behavior and Flashover Simulator

Each year, firefighters are seriously injured or killed in the Line of Duty when confronted by deteriorating conditions, rapid fire growth and flashover. This class will utilize Drager's Swede Survival System in a safe, controlled environment helping firefighters recognize the key indicators of flashover to make risk-based decisions to avoid being caught in a flashover situation. The goal of this class is to increase firefighter awareness of flashover techniques and safety.

ICS 100 & 200 and NIMS 700 & 800

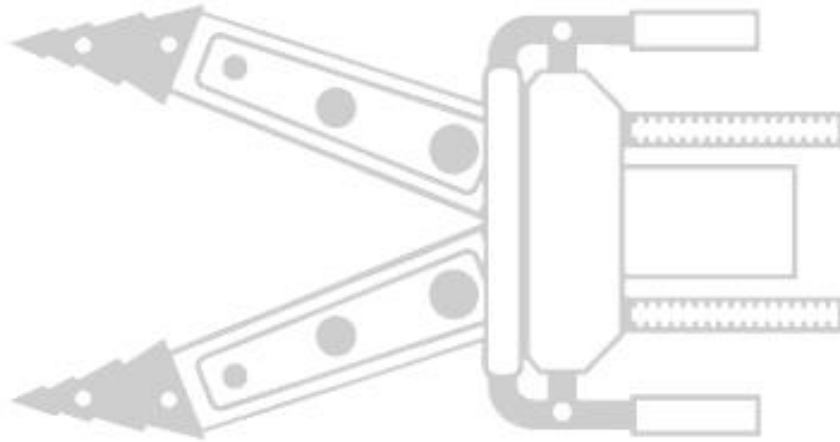

ICS 100, Introduction to the Incident Command System, introduces the Incident Command System (ICS) and provides the foundation for higher level ICS training. This course describes the history, features and principles, and organizational structure of the Incident Command System. It also explains the relationship between ICS and the National Incident Management System (NIMS).

ICS 200 is designed to enable personnel to operate efficiently during an incident or event within the Incident Command System (ICS). ICS-200 provides training on and resources for personnel who are likely to assume a supervisory position within the ICS.

This course introduces and overviews the National Incident Management System (NIMS). NIMS provides a consistent nationwide template to enable all government, private-sector, and nongovernmental organizations to work together during domestic incidents.

The course introduces participants to the concepts and principles of the National Response Framework.



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
